## 🛞 Yonsei University Campus Map 🛞





- Cheongsongdae is Yonsei's backyard, a peaceful forested area filled with lush pine trees.
- Every May, 'Feast in the Forest', an outdoor music festival, is held here.
- Yonsei Radio Observatory, is part of the KVN, Korean VLBI (Very Long Baseline Interferometer) Networks, with a 21-m radio telescope built in 2001.
- Together with observatories in Ulsan and Jeju, it functions like a 500 km-diameter telescope, capable of detecting 2 mm objects from 500 km away.

- **2** Underwood Memorial House 언더우드가기념관
- H.G. Underwood, an American missionary of English origin, was the founder of Yonsei University.
- His son, Dr. Han-gyeong Won, the 3rd president of Yonhui College (the predecessor of Yonsei University), built a house on the hill west of campus in 1927.
- This residence became the cradle of modern education and Christian mission work.
- In 1974, Dr. II-han Won, son of Dr. Hangyeong Won, donated the house and surrounding land to Yonsei University, and we named it "Underwood Memorial House".
- It features an exhibition of photos and books related to the Underwood family.



(Gwanghyewon) (अलीध)

- This wooden hanok is a full-scale restoration of **Gwanghyewon**.
- **Gwanghyewon** was a royal hospital opened in 1885 by N.H. Allen, an American missionary and medical doctor, under the appointment of King Gojong.
- It was the first modern hospital in Korea and related with the beginning of Yonsei University and Severance hospital. It was the first institution to teach Western medicine in Korea.
- The building was restored in this park in 1987 and now serves as the Yonsei Archives, preserving the history of Yonsei University.



- Underwood Hall was built to commemorate Dr. H.G. Underwood, the founder and first president of Yonhui College, which later became Yonsei University, with a donation from his brother, John Underwood.
- It was originally used by the College of Liberal Arts. Since 1982, it has housed the President's Office, Office of Planning and Management, and other administrative departments.
- In front of the building stands a statue of Dr.
  H.G. Underwood, along with a beautiful garden.
- Bullet marks, traces of the Korean War, can still be seen on the stone base beneath the statue.





- **Dong-ju Yoon**, one of Korean's most beloved poets, was a Yonsei alumnus.
- He was imprisoned for his involvement in the independence movement and died at the age of 27 in Fukuoka Prison, Japan, in 1945. His clear and pure poems, such as 'Prelude' and 'Counting the stars at night', have inspired generations and continue to resonate with youth.
- A literature statue of him erected by the student council, his family, and fellow writers. Every year on his memorial day, visitors leave flowers in remembrance.
- At the bottom of the stairs lies a literary garden with panels, where you can enjoy the poetry of Yonsei alumni, including Dong-ju Yoon.
